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World Sickle Cell Disease Awareness Day is June 19, 2019;

Blood transfusions play a key role in treatment of patients with Sickle Cell Disease

(June 12, 2019 | Davenport, Iowa) –Mississippi Valley Regional Blood Center (MVRBC) will join other blood centers, patients, and advocates in recognizing June 19, 2019 as World Sickle Cell Disease Awareness Day. The international awareness day is observed annually with the goal to increase public knowledge and understanding of sickle cell disease, and the challenges experienced by patients and their families and caregivers.

On June 19, the Sickle Cell Disease Association of America will collaborate with other agencies to carry out a 24-hour social media campaign to “Shine the Light on Sickle Cell.” Those interested in organizing or attending a “Shine the Light on Sickle Cell” event are asked to email ShineTheLightOnSickleCell@gmail.com and to follow the campaign on Facebook at www.facebook.com/ShineTheLightOnSickleCell.

In the United States, Sickle Cell Disease primarily affects African-American and Latino populations. Patients with Sickle Cell Disease rely on regular blood transfusions as part of their treatment. Transfusions of red blood cells can replace “sickled” cells with healthy red blood cells, thereby relieving pain and complications that come with Sickle Cell Disease. Suitable blood components for Sickle Cell Disease patients most often come from African-American and Latino donors. As a result, the Blood Center continually looks to increase the rate of blood donation within these populations.

“Sickle Cell patients often require many transfusions over long periods of treatment,” said Dr. Yasuko Erickson, Chief Medical Officer. “Quality and longevity of life are at stake. Increasing the diversity of our donor base means we can ensure the availability of well-matched blood components for sickle cell patients when they need it.”

Blood donor Ashley Morgan says she is motivated to give blood on a regular basis because blood transfusions were so important to her late cousin’s treatment for Sickle Cell Disease. “Christopher passed away a few years ago, but I continue to give blood because I know how important it is for my blood type to help people with sickle cell.”
